Fire Department Update	2024 2 28 Fire dept Chief Hurlbut gave an update for the fire department.
Historical Commission Update	 Cathy Harragian, chair of the Historical Commission, addressed the board. At the last Town meeting, residents voted affirmatively to keep, maintain, and update the West Sterling Schoolhouse. Ms. Harragian gave the following update; The DCR will remove the milking room at the Stillwater Farm DCR property on Rte. 140, due to safety issues The commission social media sites are; https://sterlingstories.substack.com/p/sterling-stories and instagram.com/historicsterlingma The Sterling Historical Commission hosted a lecture presented by Professor Jonathan White, from Christopher Newport University. He is the author of the book "My Work Among the Freedmen" which is an historical study of Harriet Buss, a Sterling native. For budgeting, the Commission requests funding to paint the interior/exterior of the schoolhouse, reglaze/repair of the historical windows at the school house, and to continue the project of restoration/repair/cleaning of historic Sterling headstones. The board requested that the Historical Commission find out the value of the building in order to prioritize maintenance and to apply for grant funding for maintenance.
Curb cut 11 Princeton Road	The Board considered a permit request for an entrance to public ways for 11 Princeton Road. Special Leg. to raise the max. age for special police officers	Chief Gaudette also requested that the board consider special legislation to change the maximum age for a special officer to be able to serve from 65 years old to 70. ARPA funding	The \$115,000.00 disbursement of ARPA funds, in March of 2022, for the school playground was not required for that project, due to State funding. Also, ARPA funding for the Building Commissioner vehicle was not used in full, leaving and excess of \$1,798.00. Therefore, select member Newman moved to rescind these ARPA disbursements (Total - of \$116,798.00). Select member Smith 2 nd . Sele member Smith – Aye. Select member Newman – Aye. Chair Cranson – Aye. Motion carried.		
	The rescindment of these disbursements makes that funding available for projects that are not being funded through Capital. The Town Administrator proposed that the money be used for the following;		
	 \$28,000.00 toward the HVAC system work at the fire department to remedy ongoing issues \$25,787.00 to replace cameras in the police department lockup area to improve officer/prisoner safety \$21,926.91 for the September storm damage after FEMA denial of claim (ARPA Flex) \$8,000.00 to buy 140 chairs for the Senior Center \$38,000.00 to upgrade library lighting to LED to improve operation and improve efficiency 		
	The total expense on these requests is \$121,713.91. Select member Newman moved to approve the disbursement of ARPA funds for these proposed projects. Select member Smith 2 nd . Select member Smith – Aye. Select member Newman – Aye. Chair Cranson – Aye. Motion carried.		
DELTA Grant	The Town Planner has requested that the Board send a letter of support regarding the current DLTA application for assistance through the MRPC. This grant will provide the drafting of maps which will assist the Open Space Implementation Committee in ultimately achieving their Master Plan goals. After discussion, select member Newman moved to support the DLTA application. Select member Smith 2nd Select member Newman – Aye. Select member Smith – Aye. Chair Cranson – Aye Motion carried.
